Wootton Road Runners is a friendly, community-based running and triathlon club with members of mixed ages and abilities. Running and competition is at the heart of what we do, but we're so much more. We are hiring our rooms to so many different user groups from the young to the elderly, from fitness classes to art classes.

The Atrium has now become a hive of activity with Knit & Natter, Book Club and now our new Man Cave group which has instantly become an amazing success. Our "What's On" page on our website details all our activities and you can also pick a sheet up from the Parish Office.

As "soft" as it sounds, sometimes, as your Parish Clerk, I find myself grinning at the marvellous delivery we have been able to provide here at the community centre. It is so encouraging to see and to be able to meet new people making the most of all the activities.

New Parish Councillor

We welcome our new parish councillor, Cllr Simon Burnell. Cllr Burnell was co-opted onto the parish council at our October meeting. He is very passionate about Wootton and is very keen to make a difference and get involved.

Anti-social behaviour

We were very disappointed to have been the brunt of some anti-social behaviour during November and on the day of our Christmas Fayre. The individuals behaved so badly that we had to bring in a security company to place door staff on the entrance to our Atrium.

Luckily, thanks to great footage on our CCTV, we were able to identify the culprits and took necessary action to ensure this doesn't happen again.

We know the action we took was quite harsh but would like to thank the parents of those children involved for the way in which they responded, and we are very pleased to report that the problem seems to have gone away.

The Parish Council have a zero-tolerance policy for any anti-social behaviour and will take action should it become necessary.

Community Governance Review

A Community Governance Review (CGR) is a way for councils to make sure that, at the parish level, governance arrangements are working as efficiently and effectively as they should be. This is achieved by asking the public, parish councils and any interested parties whether they feel their communities are suitably represented and whether parish councils would like to see any changes made to their current governance arrangements.

Following the change in the local government structure and the creation of West Northants Council (WNC) a CGR has been commissioned.

A Community Governance Review can make a number of changes to parish councils when there is clear evidence to do so, including:

- Creating, merging, altering or abolishing parishes
- Change electoral arrangements for parishes including the ordinary year of an election, number of parish councillors and changes to parish wards
- Convert a parish council to a parish meeting
- Change the name or the style of a new parish/ town council or parish meeting
- Group parishes together under a common parish

The consultation process is underway for this CGR and Wootton Parish Council have responded to WNC informing them that wish for a change in the parish boundary to ensure all houses using Wootton's services fall within the new boundary area.

This is only the beginning of the process, and more information will come out from WNC in the very near future.

Wootton Memorial Hall Wootton, we have a problem

The future of the Hall may depend on you!

A community-owned charity

Firstly, just a little background – The Memorial Hall is nearly 100 years old and was originally constructed on land purchased with donations from the villagers of Wootton, after the end of World War 1.

It is therefore owned by OUR community, and it is in every residents interest to ensure that it continues to serve us all, long into the future.

As a registered charity, ownership of the Hall is vested in a small number of Trustees, but its administration, financial management and daily operation is co-ordinated by an equally small number of volunteers who form a Management Committee, referred to as the Council.

Like so many similar organisations, the Council will only operate effectively if it is continually changing through the addition of fresh blood able to bring energy and new ideas to the table, ensuring the Hall continues to thrive as one of our village's most prized venues for a whole variety of community activities.

Upcoming retirements, in May 2024, including that of the current Council Chair, David Blackbourn, after his 12 years of dedicated service to the Hall and the village, dictate that it is now time to strengthen the composition of the Council in order to meet changing needs and new challenges over the next few years.

Help is urgently required

Can you help us to secure the volunteers we are seeking for the Council by spreading the word, perhaps using social media, to colleagues, friends, family, neighbours etc. or perhaps, by putting yourself forward.

Being a Council Member is not an onerous task. Participating in a 2-hour evening meeting once every 2 to 3 months to review and discuss ongoing projects, Hall finances and future plans is all we ask. Joint Enforcement Days of Action

Dear residents,

I wanted to take a moment to update you on some enforcement action that has taken place over two days on 24th and 25th January in the Wootton parish regarding bad parking around schools.

This is an issue that I know is of concern to the residents of Wootton and as your policing team we have seen an increase in reports of inconsiderate and poor parking by motorists around schools over the last few months.

In conjunction with West Northants Council enforcement officer's we have carried out enforcement and educational activity over the last two days focussing around Caroline Chisolm School and Wootton Primary School following concerns raised at these locations.

A number of motorists were spoken to and educated about their parking. This joint working between the police and WNC is ongoing activity and further days of action will be taking place throughout the school year. Road safety is a locally identified priority within the community and the safety of children attending schools within the community will always be a priority for Northants police.

I would urge all motorists at school pick up and drop off times to think carefully around their parking ensuring they comply with the law and put the safety of pedestrians and children first.

If any residents have any concerns they wish to raise with their local neighbourhood team then please get in touch with us.





A new calendar year

January provides an opportunity to reflect on goals and set targets to achieve them

We hope that you have had a great start to 2024. Although our children are already very aspirational, January proved to be a great time to reflect on their goals for the remainder of the year and set targets to work towards to ensure they achieve them. In turn, it also gave us the chance to reflect on the previous term, which at Preston Hedges seemed to fly by.

As always, during the Autumn Term, the children worked hard within the classroom and helping to bring the curriculum to life were visitors, such as: Leigh from Silhouette Theatre company who led Shakespeare Drama Workshops, Pamela from the Life Education Hub who worked with children across the whole school delivering part of the RPSHE curriculum, as well as Raptor Dave, Mr Sorrentino from Sorrentinos Restaurant and the Police who shared parts of the role with the younger children.

In addition to visitors, children also completed trips and learning outside of the classroom, including; Early Years, who went to watch Stickman, Year 4, who went to the Panto and Year 1, who walked to St. George the Martyr Church, where they sang carols and narrated the nativity story.

There were also opportunities to support initiatives in the local community too. Our Eco-Warrior team, along with Miss Hipwell, worked with Councillor Helen Hodgkinson to plant trees which was a great experience in itself, but also another way to support the environment. There were also whole school projects, one being children from Early Years to Year 6 putting on a performance for elderly

WOOTTON HERITAGE ORGANISATION

In January, the WHO held its first meeting of 2024 with an imaginative, idiosyncratic, presentation about the history of Delapre Abbey that interested and challenged a healthy turnout of members. We learned something about dress and behaviour in the late Middle Ages, had a slightly controversial view of the Battle of Northampton and heard some tenuous links between Delapre and both Joan of Arc and Dracula. It was quite an interactive session that seemed to hold audience interest.

Lots more to come this spring

The programme continues on February 21st when WHO chair, Christine Ansell, will talk on '**The Deserted Villages of Northamptonshire**' showing how changes in the rural economy generated dramatic changes in rural life.

On March 20th '**What did the Georgians eat?**' by Alison Eskriett will give us some insights into food consumption in the 18th and early 19th centuries. There may not be any samples on offer but the descriptions and analysis may (or may not) whet the audience appetites. It certainly should be interesting.

A significant Northampton landmark is the Eleanor Cross and at the meeting on April 17th Andrew Tennet will talk about the woman it commemorates, **Eleanor of Castile**, the wife of Edward I. The cross is well known and its origin probably known but the woman who it remembers much less so; it should be an informative talk. The traditional **May Festival** in conjunction with Wootton Primary School is scheduled for May 5th. Planning is now underway with details to be available closer to the day. It involves school pupils and will have various events, entertainments and the usual delicious refreshments. Keep an eye open for information about what exactly is happening.

The Spring meetings conclude on May 15th with a talk about a largely unsung event in the history of British cinema. '**Hollywood in Irthlingborough**' will tell the story of a 1913 film version of the Battle of Waterloo that was shot improbably in the small Northants town of Irthlingborough. Likely to be an eye-opener for most of the audience.

Wootton Primary School is one of the first schools to be rewarded with the West Northamptonshire Council's new Healthy Schools Award.

Healthy Schools Award



The Healthy Schools Award is designed to improve the health and wellbeing of whole school communities which must attain certain standards across areas including mental health and wellbeing, healthy eating, physical activity and PSHE (personal, social, health and economic education). Standards have been specifically designed and tailored to Northamptonshire, which makes it unique compared to other healthy schools awards.

Jonny Smith has been the lead member of staff for this initiative and the school has already signed up to start working towards the Healthy Schools Silver Award, which involves them focusing a universal and targeted health priority in their setting and putting an intervention in place.

Cllr Fiona Baker, Cabinet Member for Childrens, Families and Education at WNC said: "I am delighted to see so many schools make a continued commitment towards giving our children a healthier future. Gaining a bronze level award is an incredible achievement and I am very excited to see so many schools sign up to work towards getting their silver award."

Cllr Matt Golby, Cabinet Member for Adult Care, Wellbeing and Health Integration at WNC said: "I am pleased that so many of our schools are committed to keeping children across West Northamptonshire healthy. The number of schools who have participated in this scheme is so encouraging, and I am proud of West Northamptonshire Council's continued effort to keeping our residents safe and well."

Wild About Wootton More Crocuses and Hedges

Britain's hedgerows stretch over 700,000km -15 times the distance to the moon! - but in the last 75 years the UK has lost 50% of its hedgerows. The Hedgerows we have left are being removed and mismanaged at an alarming rate. Wootton Parish residents have started to reverse this trend. In the last three years they have planted over 1400 tree whips in a new hedgerow alongside Wooldale Road and beside the path at the top of the Recreation Ground. By the spring of 2024 Wootton will have planted over 1800 new trees. Most of them in the new hedgerow beside Wooldale Road. This does not include 70 plus 3 to 4 metre trees planted in the Wootton Pocket Park and the Memorial Garden.

The tree whips (very young trees) planted in Wootton were sourced from The Woodland Trust and Tree Appeal. These organisations provide free trees to community organisations such as Wootton Parish Council and Rotary Club Northampton West who made a joint application for the trees.

The planting of the hedge involved a lot of people. This included residents of Wootton, Caroline Chisholm School pupils, Wootton Scouts and Members of Rotary Club Northampton West. The Wooldale Road hedge has been a great success. The tree survival success rate has been 85%. This compares very well with the 2023 report of Highways Agency plantings on the A14. That had a 75% failure rate. Before the spring of

2024 it is hoped to complete the Wooldale Road hedgerow with approximately 450 trees whips. It is planned that Wootton Primary School Pupils will join other volunteers in the planting of the trees.

Since the winter of 2021/22 over 3000 purple flowering crocus corms have been planted in Wootton. These have all been donated by Rotary Club Northampton West. The planting of the purple crocus commemorates the 99.9 % success in achieving a polio free world. For over 35 years Rotary and its Members have been committed to raising funds to pay for polio vaccine throughout the world. When the vaccine dose has been given, a recipient has purple dye painted in their little finger. The Purple Crocus commemorates the purple mark.

Crocus flowers look wonderful as Winter turns into Spring. Crocus pollen is also one of the best early sources of food for bumble bees.

In the winter of 2021/22, about 600 purple crocuses were planted beside the path at the top the Recreation Ground. The planting was undertaken by the residents of Wootton, Wootton Scouts, and Members of Rotary Club Northampton West. There was a further small planting in the Memorial Gardens in the winter of 2022/23. This Winter a further 2000 plus crocus corms were planted in the Memorial Garden.

If you would like to become involved in enhancing the living environment in Wootton the Wild About Wootton group is keen to increase its numbers. Membership does not require a regular commitment. The group does various tasks on an ad-hoc basis. If members are available, then that's great! If not, there is a next time. 

RPC Corps 84th Birthday

The Northampton Branch of the RPC Association decided to celebrate the Corps' 84th birthday (17th October) by holding a small ceremony at the new Wootton Parish memorial garden- on the site of what was the RPC Training Centre. This was organised by Mr Tom Appleyard with the help of members of Wootton Parish Council. The ceremony started by Tom welcoming everyone present and explained that it was intended to explain where the Pioneers originated from and paint a picture of the Corps. Mr Norman Brown described the origins of the Corps which was the Labour Corps. This Corps was formed in 1917 to obtain more fluidity in utilising the services of men in Infantry Labour and Works Units. Although the Corps was disbanded in 1919 during its short history

it lost over 8,000 killed. A Special Order of the Day from Field Marshall Sir Douglas Haig, Commander in Chief British Armies in France was read out. This order commended the Corps and brought distinction and credit on it. Mr Appleyard then explained what the Royal Pioneer Corps, which was formed on 17th October 1939, achieved in the Second World War where it was the largest Corps in the British Army. The Corps had an infantry role, helped in mine clearance, guarded basis and prisoners of war, laid prefabricated track on beaches, unloaded ships, helped with both Mulberry Harbours and PLUTO (pipe-line under the ocean) which they continued for 250 miles in Europe. They also with the REs helped to construct airfields and bridging. In November 1946, George VI in recognition of

their performance during the war decreed that the Corps should have the distinction "Royal". The Corps had the honour of being granted the Freedom of both Northampton and Bicester and a large number of streets within Simpson Manor were named after Pioneers as well as the main square in Bicester Town. The Corps lost over 14,000 soldiers killed in WW2 and these are remembered each year at the Cenotaph where Pioneers make one of the largest contingents marching. Mr Brown then described the many countries that the Corps had served in post Wold War 2 until amalgamation into the RLC in 1993. These included Germany where the Corps at one time administered 39,000 locally engaged civilians, Palestine and Jordan, Korea, Cyprus (in both the troubles of 1963 and 1974), Kuwait, Aden, Libya, Malaya, Singapore and Brunei, In Northern Ireland the Corps was committed from the early days of the troubles and at various time proved the Prisoner

Guard Force at HMP Magilligan, the Maze and Crumblin Road. In 1982 Pioneers landed with 5 Brigade in the Falklands and were to witness the bombing of the ships Sir Galahad and Sir Tristian, they were also involved in the task to identify, exhume and inter at San Carlos and repatriate 64 dead back to the UK as the Army Graves Registration Team. Finally in 1990 the Corps was heavily involved in Op Granby leading to the Gulf War. Two Pioneers Companies deployed to Saudi Arabia in support of 1 Armoured Division. The Branch Standard bearer, Mr Kev Broome, then lowered the Branch Standard and 2 minutes silence was held. Mr Steve Harrod then read out "Ode of Remembrance" after which Brig Charles Telfer laid a wreath at the memorial stone. Finally Mr Gerry Vick asked everyone to read with him the RPC Corps Collect. 17 then went to the nearby Toby Inn for a meal.



Wootton People Hayley Valentine

Each edition of the Mag will feature someone who lives or works in Wootton. In this edition the Parish Clerk, Tina Charteress, interviews Hayley Valentine.

Hayley has been working in the café at the Community Centre for over a year and is known to many of us as a friendly face who makes great coffee or takes our money at the till. But what most of the visitors will not know is that Hayley is a champion fighter. Here she tells Tina about her passion and ambitions.

What is the type of fighting called?

I do Mixed Martial Arts (MMA) which is like a combination of boxing, wrestling and kickboxing. I also do Brazilian Ju Jitsu which is a mixture of judo and wrestling.

How long have you been doing that and how did you start?

About 8 years ago I thought about joining the police service and wanted to get fit so I joined the BST Academy at Sixfields behind M&S but soon fell in love with MMA and Ju Jitsu.

And I hear you are pretty good. Do you fight in competitions?

I'm ranked number 2 in the UK for women's MMA in the 48-kilogram category and can have bouts anywhere in the UK. My last bout was in Birmingham against a fighter from Manchester.

And the Ju Jitsu?

My last fights were in Sheffield in early December where I took the gold medal in the competition. I've been invited to fight in Croatia in February 2024 and if I do well, I could be invited to compete in Las Vegas.

You are clearly passionate about your sport – so what are your ambitions?

I am totally committed to being the best I can be, and I train every day after I finish at the café and at weekends. I want to be ranked



number 1 in the UK for MMA and I also want to get international recognition in Ju Jitsu by winning in Croatia and Las Vegas.

I am also passionate about my teaching and want to continue teaching. I teach selfdefence for women – a free class at the BST Academy and I also teach children.

Do you get paid for winning fights?

Sometimes I may receive a small amount which is shared between me and my coaches but basically I have to find the money for my travel, accommodation and expenses. For example, when I fought in Ireland, I had to fund it myself and was in and out of Ireland in a day! I'm currently saving hard to try to get to Croatia in February.

I also have to have a special diet that costs more than standard meals because, in association with my training, it helps me to be the fittest I can be. Hayley, many thanks for talking with me. You are obviously so committed and passionate about your sport. Good luck for the future and keep making great coffee!

This service aims to provide company, reassurance, and low-level support to an older vulnerable person in their own home when a delay is anticipated for Primary or Secondary care support. It can be a worrying time when older people are waiting for further support at home, our aim is to assign a volunteer to be that much needed "friendly face" for up to two hours.

This service currently covers Northampton and Wellingborough and the surrounding areas, including East Northamptonshire.

To join this rewarding service, we ask that you are:-

- age 18 or over
- a confident caring person with empathy for older people

Electrical scooters (also known as e-scooters) come under the category of "powered transporters"; this covers a range of personal transport devices which are powered by a motor.

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988. Which means the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to e-scooters including the need to have a licence, insurance and tax.

It's not currently possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces. If you're using a private e-scooter you risk the vehicle being seized under S.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 for no insurance.

If you cause serious harm to another person whilst riding an e-scooter the incident will be investigated in the same way it would if you were riding a motorcycle or driving a car.

Legal use of an e-scooter

It's legal to use an e-scooter on private land with the permission of the land owner. Where a trial rental scheme is running, it's legal to use a rental e-scooter on a public road or cycle lane, provided you have the correct licence and follow road traffic regulations.

Rental e-scooter trials

Trials of rental e-scooters are taking place in the UK. Anyone using a rental e-scooter on a public road or other public space, has to comply with the relevant road traffic legislation or they face potential prosecution.

To rent an e-scooter you must:

- meet the minimum age limit; these can vary depending on the provider, so please check with them
- hold the correct driving licence (category Q or P/M)

• create an account with the rental company E-scooters can only be used in approved areas.

Penalties and offences

If you don't have a licence, or the correct licence, or are riding without insurance you could face a Fixed Penalty notice:

- with a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for having no insurance
- up to £100 fine and three to six penalty points for riding without the correct licence You could also be committing an offence if you're caught:
- riding on a pavement; Fixed Penalty Notice and possible £50 fine
- using a mobile phone or other handheld mobile device while riding; £200 and six penalty points
- riding through red lights; Fixed Penalty Notice, £100 fine and possible penalty points
- drink driving: the same as if you were driving a car, you could face court imposed fines, a driving ban and possible imprisonment

If you're using an e-scooter in public in an antisocial manner, you can also risk the e-scooter being seized under section 59 of the Police Reform Act.

When riding an e-scooter, we would always recommend wearing safety protection such as a helmet and to keep to the speed limit.

Wild About Wootton More Trees Please!

Ambitious planting project sees 42 trees planted in Wootton.

For the second year in a row, Wootton Parish Council has been successful in our application for grant funding from the Urban Tree Challenge Fund to support another wonderful tree planting project to increase the tree canopy coverage in our community.

At the end of November, along with children from Caroline Chisholm School and Preston Hedges Primary School, volunteers from our residents, and many local groups including Northampton Rotary Club, Climate Action – West Northamptonshire (CA-WN) and the trusty Wild About Wootton volunteer group, we planted an incredible 42 mature trees across our community!

The day started with interviews with BBC Radio Northants followed by a planting demonstration from Russell Horsey and his team from Woodland Dwelling, who oversaw the whole project.

19 red maples have been planted along the walkway down from the Co-op to CCS. We planted an additional nine disease resistant elms on the adjacent pathways to the elm tree avenue that we planted in November '22. Four Red Maples were placed along the fence line by the roundabout near CCS and ten additional trees were planted at the Simpson Manor Memorial Garden, which included seven Liquid Amber and three Tulip Trees.

Protecting and planting trees is critical in our fight against climate change and biodiversity loss. Trees bring so many benefits to our planet and, therefore, us. We are dependent on a healthy and thriving natural environment for our existence and wellbeing. Trees bring so many benefits including the removal of carbon dioxide from our atmosphere, urban cooling, reducing air pollution, and flood prevention. And they help to create attractive and soul nourishing environments to spend time in, as well as provide important habitat for our wildlife.

The community spirit and support on the day was simply wonderful and we hope that the tress will flourish and thrive for many years and generations to come.




Anti-bullying organisations



St George the Martyr Church



Many of our churches have been places of celebration in the community for decades, if not centuries. The older buildings look fabulous in photographs and the years of prayer encourage a sense of awe and wonder, not always present in hotels or other venues. You can still enjoy the benefits of a commercial venue for the reception and / or evening party.

As I said some years ago, the unique advantage of a church wedding is that the declarations and vows are made overtly in the presence of God. The preface to the marriage service states, "Marriage is a gift of God in creation, through which husband and wife may know the grace of God." Rather than simply the couple entwined in law, a wedding in church invites God to be the third strand of the rope. As the Good News translation of the Bible says, "Two people can resist an attack that would defeat one person alone. A rope made of three cords is hard to break." (Ecclesiastes 4:12).

In a marriage service, the groom and bride are each asked if they will take the other to love, comfort, honour and protect etc. The response is not, "I do" but "I will". Marriage is a choice in English law, not a state that can be forced on anyone else. This makes it a wonderful celebration. "I choose to spend the rest of my life with you in love and faithfulness." What a fabulous gift!

Love is a choice, not a feeling. That is the basis of a sound marriage and the message of Easter. Jesus chose to die on a cross, putting to death everything that is not loving (the Bible's word for this is 'sin') and being raised from death to show God's love is more powerful than anything else, even death. The gift of God's love is now freely available to



anyone who wants to live as Jesus did. Church weddings are blessed by the God of love. In church, we are interested not simply in your wedding day. We want to support you in a lifelong, life-enhancing marriage, filled with love in the good times and bad.

Whatever your thoughts about marriage, you are free to choose love over hate, envy, frustration, selfishness, belittling and any other destructive behaviour towards yourself and/or anyone else. Doing so in the power of the God of love makes this choice more possible, since when we forget, we can be forgiven, restored and gradually transformed into more loving people.


Wild About Wootton A walk on the wild side of Wootton

Day after day of steel grey skies, biting winds and curtains of rain have dragged many of us down into a blue mood. Nature also seems to have gone to ground. Brown battered leaves pile up under hedges, summer flowers have long since faded leaving brittle skeletons behind. But is everything really as dead as it seems? Wrapping up against the elements and venturing outside may seem pointless but there are still things out there to stir the soul

A short walk away Wootton Brook wends its way through apparently withered meadows and dormant trees. In our house this is known as the triangle but is Higgins meadow and Nanny Calfs meadow (see map below). However, a closer look reveals that a wide variety of seed heads remain, rising

above weather beaten vegetation. On frostv mornings teasel heads are encrusted with ice crystals. They sparkle in the beams of the weak winter sun, bringing a touch of magic to the meadows. On warmer days they attract one of our most colourful native birds. A small flock of chattering Goldfinches swoop over the meadow in search of the tiny seeds encased within the prickly heads. They are aptly named. Rising into the pewter sky, they reveal a bright flash of gold across their wings. This and the combination of a ruby red, white, and black head bring a bright splash of colour on even the dullest day.

Mist slowly rises from the brook, rolling along the bank and over the fluffy bullrush heads. Across the brook a Jay sounds the alarm and

flies from one stand of trees to another. Their pinkish body, white rump, and electric blue flash on the wings shine through the mist.

Further on a Kestrel is perched in the top of a gnarled hawthorn tree. Its ginger brown body and slate grev head motionless as it scans the scrub below for prey. Taking flight, it hovers and seems to hang in the air. Suddenly it drops low to the ground before soaring back into the sky. Unlucky this time it settles back on the top branches and begins the search again.

Another aerial master glides majestically into view. A Red Kite floats effortlessly on the breeze, its triangular notched tail twisting to adjust and compensate for the wind direction. The white patches on the outerwing stark against the dark wing tips as it drifts overhead and soon disappears from view.

Green woodpecker, Heron and Little Egret are just some of the other birds that can often be found in the meadows and water course.

It is not just the skies that are bursting with life. A meadow survey carried out by the Wildlife Trust in June 2023 found a wide variety of plants. Cow Parley, Greater Burdock, Meadowsweet and Lady's Bedstraw along with many other species were found. These provide a rich source of nectar for Meadow Brown and Marbled White butterflies, bees, and other invertebrates

These meadows are a small but very valuable refuge for wildlife and humans alike. Even iust a short walk in nature has been shown to have many health benefits. However, the irony of this area being close to the busy dual carriageway is not lost. Despite this my footsteps and mood feel lighter as I head back towards Wooldale Road having soaked up some of nature's treasures.




